
The 300 Club is a valuable source of income for the school and by entering, you are helping raise much needed funds to help the school purchase vital equipment which otherwise might not be available.

Graduated Approach Stages for Attendance

In order to ensure that all attendance concerns are responded to efficiently, a graduated approach has been implemented at Bleak Hill Primary School. The following 5 stages describe how we will respond to attendance concerns.

Attendance Concerns

- Attendance below 93% is considered an attendance concern
- Persistent Absentee below 90% Attendance
- Entrenched poor attendance significantly below 90%
- Attendance below 50% with the need for external agency support
- Absence patterns
- · Arrivals after classroom doors have closed
- Lateness after the register closes
- School anxiety that requires pastoral support
- Family circumstances that impact on attendance



Graduated Approach Stages for Attendance

Stage 3 – Attendance Contract Meeting Escalation to an Attendance Contract meeting if poor Communicate with parents/carers and arrange attendance continues and improvements are a meeting to discuss how to improve attendance. not seen. Clear expectations for improvements to be discussed and set out in an attendance Home visits may occur if absence continues. Monitor and follow-up meeting to be arranged. If concerns remain, move to Stage 4. Stage 4 - Senior Leadership Team Escalation to Headteacher and/or Senior Leaders if Review previous stages. absence persists and support is not working or not Attendance meeting to be arranged with a member of the Senior Leadership Team where being engaged with. concerns will be discussed, and next steps outlined. A Fixed Penalty Notice may be issued. Monitor and follow-up meeting to be arranged. If absence persists, move to stage 5. Stage 5 - Education Welfare and/or Social Care Referral Escalation to Education Welfare and/or Social Care via Review previous stages. TESSA in order to protect the pupils right to an EHAT (Early Help Assessment Tool) will education. be considered. Possible referral via TESSA to social care and/or Education Welfare. Possible statutory intervention or prosecution.

10 tips to keep your children safe online

The internet has transformed the ability to access content. Many apps that children use are dependent on user-generated content which can encourage freedom of expression, imagination and creativity. However, due to the sheer volume uploaded every day, it can be difficult for platforms to regulate and moderate everything, which means that disturbing or distressing images, videos or audio clips can slip through the net. That's why we've created this guide to provide parents and carers with some useful tips on keeping children safe online.



MONITOR VIEWING HABITS

Whilst most apps have moderation tools, inappropriate content can still slip through the net.



CHECK ONLINE CONTENT

Understand what's being shared or what seems to be 'trending' at the moment.



CHECK AGE-RATINGS

Make sure they are old enough to use the app and meet the recommended age-limit.



CHANGE PRIVACY SETTINGS

Make accounts private and set content filters and parental controls where possible.



SPEND TIME ON THE APP

Get used to how apps work, what content is available and what your child likes to watch.



LET CHILDREN KNOW YOU'RE THERE



ENCOURAGE CRITICAL THINKING

Talk about what people might post online and why some posts could cause distress.



LEARN HOW TO REPORT & BLOCK

Always make sure that children know how to use the reporting tools on social media apps.



KEEP AN OPEN DIALOGUE





SEEK FURTHER SUPPORT

If a child has been affected by something they've seen online, seek support from your school's safeguarding lead.

Letter to parents and guardians from Merseyside Police re. Halloween and Bonfire Night

We are writing to all parents and guardians to ask for your help over the upcoming Halloween and Bonfire Night period.

We want everyone to have fun and we'll be working hard to keep you safe, but we need your help:

Know where your children are

- · Encourage kids to go to local events that are being organised, or try a spooky film together
- If your children are going out (particularly on the 30th and 31st of October), make sure you
 know where they're going. If possible, drop them off and pick them up
- Don't let your children hang around the street
- · If they're going somewhere local walk there with them
- · Have an agreed time when they need to be home
- Don't buy fireworks or eggs and flour for them, and don't let them take it out of the house

Know the risks

- Throwing things at cars, buses, shops and houses can hurt people drivers might swerve if
 they get distracted and cause a crash, or someone might get hurt by broken glass (and
 scratched paintwork can be very expensive to fix)
- Getting into trouble with the police can lead to a criminal record, which means not being able to go on holiday to countries like the USA, and not being able to do certain jobs
- Messing around with fireworks is dangerous some burn as hot as 1,200 degrees hot
 enough to melt glass and cause serious or fatal injuries

Know the law

If a young person under the age of 16 commits any of the offences below, the parent/guardian will have to pay the fine.

- A person under the age of 16 can be arrested and fined if found with an unlit firework
- A person under the age of 16 can also be arrested and fined if they throw or light a firework or make a bonfire
- A person under the age of 16 can be arrested and fined for throwing things like eggs, flour, paint or other objects at people, vehicles or property

Baby / Child

Teen

Shampoo & conditioner, period products, skincare, body wipes, haircare, shower gel, bubble bath, deodorant, body spray, disposable razors & shaving products, toothpaste & toothbrush, hair styling products, nail clippers, grooming products, makeup.



Adult
